Wait begins for South Australia's Year 12s as last of exams completed

The wait for Year 12 results across South Australia will begin this afternoon (19 November) after students tackle the last of the Stage 2 written exams of the year - Geography and Musicianship.

The SACE Board estimates about 22,000 students across the State undertook at least one Stage 2 subject this year, with about 640 sitting for Geography and Musicianship on the last day of examinations.

Results are scheduled to be released online on Thursday 18 December and students will also be posted their results through the mail.

SACE Board Chief Executive, Dr Neil McGoran, said while the end of exams may be a relief for students, the substantial task of marking and moderating student work was now being undertaken by more than 2000 SACE Board assessors.

"This rigorous quality assurance process ensures grades are consistent in each subject and comparable across all schools," Dr McGoran said.

"The SACE Board is grateful to the hundreds of dedicated teachers who provide their time to appraise students' end-of-year assessments.

"And while assessors roll up their sleeves, it is time for students to take time out for a welldeserved break with family and friends," he said.

However, Dr McGoran reminded students to check their 'Students Online' accounts well before results time to ensure they receive their SACE results in a timely fashion.
