New heights of achievement by SACE students

A record 15,003 South Australian students will celebrate their completion of the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) today – an increase of 335 on the previous year.

The proportion of Year 12 students successfully achieving the SACE was a record high, rising to 96.3 per cent. Five years ago, the completion rate was 91.6 per cent.

The new benchmarks set by South Australian students:

- More Aboriginal students completed senior secondary education (319 students, 24 more than 2015)
- More students undertook vocational education and training (VET) in SACE (6330 students, 341 more than 2015)
- More students completed a modified SACE, offered to students with intellectual disabilities (226 students, 7 more than 2015)
- More students achieved merit certificates (996 students, 76 more than 2015).

The updated SACE was more rigorous than the previous certificate – with students required to meet defined literacy and numeracy standards.

These results demonstrate a clear commitment from schools to continuous improvement in a range of areas, including SACE completion, subject achievement, and teachers' assessment capacity.

We will work closely with schools to build upon this progress. Results from the past five years have vindicated the changes to the SACE.

The next five years are a critical opportunity to innovate – through renewed curriculum and digital assessment, to enable our young people to continue to meet the challenges of the future.

SACE Results 2016: At a Glance

- 15,003 students achieved their SACE compared with 14,668 last year an increase of 335 students.
- 319 Aboriginal students completed their SACE the most ever up from 295 in 2015.
- More students undertook VET in SACE 6330 students compared with 5989 in 2015
 - More students completed a VET Certificate III or higher as part of their SACE 1979 students compared with 1612 in 2015
 - More students counted a VET Certificate III or higher towards their ATAR from 1235 students compared with 1060 in 2015
 - Students completed a broad range of VET qualifications, across a diverse range of industry areas, including sport and recreation (11.1 per cent), hospitality (10.2 per cent), and community services (7.7 per cent).
- A record 3995 South Australian country students celebrated their completion of the SACE— an increase of 162 compared with 2015
- A record number of students completed the Modified SACE by studying at least one modified subject 226 compared to 219 last year.

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
